

HOS survey of Lesser Spotted Woodpeckers 2022

Hampshire is probably the most important county in England and Wales for breeding Lesser Spotted Woodpeckers (LSW). Rob Clements in his 2020 paper (Clements 2020) estimated the Hampshire population as up to 250-300 pairs. This is probably more than 10% of the national total (Smith *et al.* 2021). There is strong evidence from the Hampshire breeding atlases (Eyre *et al.* 2015) that the numbers and distribution of LSW in Hampshire outside the New Forest are declining. There are still good numbers in the Forest but we don't know for sure whether they are stable or declining.

The key aim of the 2022 survey is to survey LSWs in a randomly selected sample of 1km squares across Hampshire using standard and repeatable methods. In this way we can establish a good baseline to allow future monitoring of the species. The selection of squares to survey will be based on sites with records of LSW over the last 10 years. The same methods will be used both within the Forest and elsewhere in the county although the numbers of squares surveyed will be higher within the Forest.

Surveys should take place during the period late February until mid-April which is the best time to detect LSW. A minimum of three visits, at least a week apart, of three hours duration, starting ideally around 7.00 am in good weather conditions will be needed. Contacts with LSW (drumming, calling, sightings) should be noted and six figure map references for each contact entered on the recording sheet. Repeated sightings, especially of pairs and other birds interacting, should enable us to build up a picture of occupied territories within the chosen study-areas.

Observers will be provided with a recording sheet for each of their squares and are encouraged to print off a 1:25000 OS map of the square on which to map their locations. These maps can easily be printed from the Web (for example <http://www.bing.com/maps>) but the survey coordinators can provide if observers have difficulty. Volunteers who find pairs of LSW will be encouraged to follow up their sightings in late May/early June, when successful nests can be located and their contents monitored by Ken and Linda Smith.
